Sons of the King THE MEN'S PROGRAM

Among all the men who have completed our Christian Life Change Recovery Program, Greg* had one of the toughest back stories. He had sold drugs in a number of states, was charged with attempted murder and spent eight years in New York's Rikers Island Prison. After Greg served his time, he had nowhere to go. He wandered the streets and slept in abandoned buildings, selling drugs again just to get by. Finally, with no resources and no hope, he came to Lebanon Rescue Mission.

Greg joined our Christian Life Change Recovery Program, but he wasn't ready to submit to the authority of the Lord right away. It took months before he allowed the Holy Spirit to bring conviction to his heart and repent of his sins. As he matured in his faith, Greg began to work alongside the men's ministry team rather than against them. Eventually, he placed his hope in Jesus Christ and was baptized.

The Greg of today bears very little resemblance to the Greg who first walked into Lebanon Rescue Mission. He has taken full advantage of our Learning Center and is now proficient at using computers. He recently accepted a position with a local employer and excels at his job. But one of the biggest changes is right on Greg's face: the joyful smile that shows he is a loved son of the King!

Safe and Growing Strong AGAPE FAMILY SHELTER

"God has blessed us," Lauren* said of herself and her two children. "From the start, I knew He was taking care of us."

A survivor of domestic violence, Lauren had nowhere to turn during a messy divorce. Being financially dependent on her husband, she felt helpless to plan a secure future for her two children. Lauren knew she needed to take action but was nervous about living in a shelter or defining herself as "homeless."

Fortunately, Lauren was directed to the Gap Housing program at Agape Family Shelter. This new program offers semi-independent women the opportunity to live on their own in housing connected to the main house, with support from Agape's staff. There, they learn to save money, budget and manage a household.

Watching her children thrive gave Lauren the strength

she needed to rebuild her life. Over the past few months, she has worked steadily, creating a nest egg and establishing a stable home for her family. She has also been encouraged in her walk with God.

Lauren tells us Agape opened her eyes to God's presence in her life, even when she felt alone. Now Agape's staff is with Lauren as she prepares for a brighter future. "I'm so thankful to the Agape Family Shelter for giving us a safe, comfortable home," she said. "You don't always reflect on what God does for you. But coming to Agape, I know He has my back."

A Bridge of Trust LEBANON FREE CLINIC

When it comes to building trust, one thing is essential: communication. But that is difficult for those who come to the Lebanon Free Clinic who speak only Spanish and a real barrier to communicating their health needs and receiving the right treatment.

This is a big concern, because 21% of those coming for help identify as Hispanic, or someone who is a native of or descends from a Spanish-speaking country. One in five can only speak Spanish.

Thankfully, one Lebanon Free Clinic volunteer comes faithfully to serve as our professional medical translator. She tells us, "I prayed to God for a calling. I'm not a teacher, or a singer or a preacher ... but I can do this."

This volunteer's gentle spirit has built the bridge of trust between patient and provider. Often, that has been the difference between life or death for the patient. Her faithfulness has enabled patients who fall through the cracks of our healthcare system to get the consistent care they need to thrive. God has used her small act of faithfulness in a big way to overcome cultural barriers in this place. What evidence of His great love!

Foundations for a Bright Future LEARNING CENTER

Those at Lebanon Rescue Mission seeking a bright future are building strong relationships with Jesus Christ and learning to obediently follow His lead, hour by hour. They are also developing practical, work-based skills for work and community living.

In our Learning Center, guests complete nine months of Tech/Ed training. This improves their academic skills and career prospects while emphasizing character development. Upon graduation, guests will be broadly equipped to be productive wherever they go with skills to:

- Access, interpret and evaluate information using multiple resources, including current information technology.
- Demonstrate proficiency in all skills necessary to acquire, process and communicate information through the use of technology.
- Demonstrate mastery of the basic skills of reading, language arts and math.

- Express ideas with clarity, logic and originality in both spoken and written English.
- Apply mathematical principles to address and solve problems.
- Gather and interpret data to address and solve both practical and theoretical problems.
- Analyze, understand and evaluate various ideas, beliefs and behaviors.
- Analyze and evaluate issues, problems and events.
- Assume responsibility for their actions and work effectively as an individual and as a member of a group.
- Explore and express personal creativity in their assignments and their life.
- Demonstrate a knowledge of critical issues.
- Demonstrate the ability to make choices based upon well-reasoned strategies.
- Demonstrate a commitment to service beyond self.
- Be prepared to successfully enter the community, work force and/or college.
