


A few months into

INVESTMENTS IN OUR CLINIC TO ADVANCE PATIENT CARE & ACCESS



he Lebanon Free Clinic continues to fill a vital need in our community for those who do not have health insurance or access to care. During the COVID pandemic, we saw a decrease in volunteers and an increase in need for our services. Our Lebanon Free Clinic is currently implementing a new electronic health records system (EHR) that will advance patient care. The new EHR system will improve safety of charting details of each visit and help facilitate referrals to outside medical facilities. Often our patients are seen both at our Clinic and referred for specialists in our community. In addition to the implementation of electronic health records, we will be hiring a paid medical provider to increase clinic appointments and decrease first appointment waiting time. Our paid staff medical provider will work with our volunteer medical providers as we extend and improve patient appointments and care. We are very excited about the changes at the Lebanon Free Clinic and thank God for His continuous provisions as we provide healthcare, mental and behavioral health services and student vision clinics for those in the greatest need in our community.

THE FIRST YEAR OF THE MOBILE SENIOR PANTRY IS A SUCCESS!

February 22, 2022 was the official start of our newest program, Mobile Senior Pantry. Individuals living in the Community Homes' senior building are thoroughly enjoying our bi-monthly visits to their building. We set up a pantry of canned goods, fresh produce, breads, personal care items, and sweet treats right in building's community room. The mobile pantry allows seniors to easily access food support without having to worry about driving to a distribution center and carrying things back to their apartments. All items shared through Mobile Senior Pantry come from the abundant blessings of donations given to LRM. The Lord turned the need for food support into a way of connecting and building new relationships. We are very touched by the gratefulness and kindness of each of the residents. During 2022, LRM shared 7,159 pounds of food with our senior friends. We are looking forward to expanding Mobile Senior Pantry during 2023. Thank you for blessing us, so that we may be a blessing to others.



WE ASKED AND THE LORD PROVIDED

In August of 2014, 1223 Bittner Blvd. became the new home of the men's program and all our administrative offices. We also now had a loading dock which dramatically changed the way we receive donations. As time went by, we began to see larger and larger donations of food, clothing, cleaning supplies and toiletries. Perishable and non-perishable food donations grew rapidly. So much so, we connected with thirty community partner organization so that we could share in the abundant blessings of donations. However, in the last two years we have had to turn down more and more food donations. We simply did not have the refrigeration, freezer and processing space to manage the increased donation load. Thoroughout this time, we prayed that the Lord would make a way for us to have the additional space, equipment, parking,



and storage to expand what we now call *The Back Dock Ministry*. In June of 2022, our prayers were answered when the 49 N. 12th Street property became available. This property is adjacent to our Bittner Campus and provides a lovely two-story house for graduate or staff housing, an additional ten-plus parking spaces, and a large garage that can be renovated to meet all our needs. As always, God has answered our prayers with more than we had asked for or even imagined! Praise God, and stay tuned for more on our new facility.

A key component to our yearlong Life Change Program is the interaction the program men have with Christian men in various stages of their life. The commitment and caring of these men have an enormous impact on our guests and our staff. Linda has shared her musical talents and love of the piano with our men and often joins Bruce when he speaks at our Wednesday Chapel Service.



When the couple heard that we were raising funds for a Cargo Delivery Van for our Mobile Senior Pantry program, they reached out to our development team to hear more about the overall program and planning. They then committed to match some funding that was coming to us through a local church partner grant. The combination of this enormous generosity made the purchase of the new van a reality. On February 22, 2022, that van made its first Mobile Senior Pantry delivery to Maple Terrace, here in Lebanon. Recently, Bruce has accepted a volunteer position on a finance team that assists LRM with future development plans. Bruce and Linda have joined a team of volunteers that bless our guests and our staff. LRM could not complete our mission without the loving support of our volunteers and generous donors. Thank you!

LOSING HIS FAMILY BROKE JACK, BUT THE LORD HEALED HIS HEART


